Painter Paul Van Ginkel works hard at his job, but he's quick to admit he still has much to learn about art.

Best known for the western themes he brings to his paintings, the 49-year-old artist (www.PaulVanGinkel.com)

has received many awards and distinctions for his work.

They include four Calgary Exhibition and Stampede Best of Show awards.

A fine-art painter, Van Ginkel has been specializing in western themes since 1990.

Born in St. Boniface, Man., he moved with his family to Calgary in 1973. In search of change and new stimulation,

he moved to Vancouver in 1996, returning to Calgary in 2001.

Prior to earning a Master of Fine Arts degree from Syracuse University in New York, he was educated at the Alberta College of Art in Calgary.

He is a member of the Oil Painters of America and was awarded the commis-

sion to paint the 2007 Calgary Exhibition and Stampede poster.

The home he, his wife Kristin, and soon-to-be four-year-old daughter, Isabella, live in faces west, providing spectacular mountain views.

Called Casa Van Ginkel, the home is a "tribute to the Spanish way of life" the couple loves, he says.

It is also where Van Ginkel pursues his career, spending his working hours in a modern, two-storey studio.

Question: Which is your favourite room?

Answer: The main floor great room.

Our great room essentially encompasses the kitchen, dining room and living room.

However, our focus is the living room because from there, we can enjoy the entire room most effectively.

Answer: I feel the room belongs to whoever occupies it. We want our guests to feel as connected to it as we do.




